From Rod Blackmores Australasian Theatre Organs

Duke of York theatre, Eastwood, Christie Theatre Organ Order no. 314 2 manuals, 7 ranks (now 2 manuals 10 ranks) at Baptist Church, Epping NSW

The Duke of York theatre, Eastwood (a northwestern Sydney suburb) was opened in 1927. It was named after the Duke who later became King George VI and who had visited Australia that year to open the new Parliament House in Canberra. A 2/7 Christie theatre organ was installed, and opened by organist **Stan Cummins** on 14th May 1932.

The organ had order no. 314 in the books of the Australian division of the English organbuilding firm Hill, Norman and Beard, and it is claimed that this was the first Christie to be wholly manufactured in Australia albeit with some imported parts. Remodelling of the theatre took place in 1938. Originally the console was on a small dais centrally placed immediately in front of the stage (see photo above); later it was moved to a position right of the stage. Two chambers, one either side of the proscenium, contained the pipework.

Organists who performed at the Duke of York included **Penn Hughes, Brian Hatfield, Ray Chaffer, Cyrus Tuckwell and Pierre de Closay.** The organ was closed down in September 1940 and remained silent until 1949. In the meantime the theatre had been absorbed into Greater Union's Odeon circuit in 1946.

Organist **Jack Pitt** officially reopened the instrument on 17th December 1949 and it was played regularly on Saturday nights until 1956. In 1957 the organ was sold to Epping Baptist Church for 750 pounds. Epping is an adjacent suburb. The theatre was demolished after closing in 1973.

At Epping the organ was subject to restoration work and installed in two chambers (one within the other – an unusual arrangement). A silky oak cladding was built to enclose the console. It opened there on 29th August 1959, dedicated by organist **Paul Edgar.**

Later, about 1967, when the church was enlarged, two adjacent chambers in the right-hand rear wall of the church were built to contain the pipework in a much more conventional arrangement, and in 1983 with three additional ranks (Concert flute, Trumpet and Open Diapason). The organ was also repitched. Most percussions and effects had been dispensed with when first installed at Epping, but some of these have been replaced.

The organ is cared for by a group of Christie enthusiasts. As well as being played for church use **there are concerts of theatre organ music.** A new chamber in the left-hand side of the rear wall has been prepared, and it is planned to add 10 further ranks controlled by a 3-manual console.

Chamber analysis at Epping is as follows:

Main chamber: Clarinet, Violin, Dulciana Celeste, Concert Flute, Violin Diapason, Vox Humana, Trumpet. Solo chamber: Open Diapason, Tuba, Tibia Clausa.

Mark Herman Concert, Sunday 19th July 2009 Marrickville Town Hall

A warm winter's day helped to entice a good crowd to attend Mark's second Sydney concert. It was in the performer's eyes; Another open 'in another show' however, it was far from a complacent performance as the title of the song suggests. On the contrary, Mark's playing promised a stunning performance to come. The writer was not disappointed and taking into account the audience 's reaction neither were they.

The song If I Loved You from Richard Roger's Carousel followed, with unsurprisingly, lush tibias and strings then a subtle key change up one semi tone, and not forgetting the song is a romantic ballad. Meet me in St. Louis, made famous by Judy Garland, was Mark's next selection and included the title song, and a reality version of the Trollev Song which slowly built up to full speed ahead and tested the player's accuracy at breakneck speed. George Wright's specialty, Boy Next Door, was expressive and soulful at first, featuring Marimba Harp, then further on the treble was underpinned by the Tuba on second touch. In the next section Sleigh Bells were heard over the Krummet. A reprise of the Trolley Song concluded the bracket.

Mark then switched to piano and we heard an interesting piece called *Nanette* which was composed by Adam Carroll of Ampico Reproducing Piano Roll fame. This song was well worth hearing. Richard Rogers was revisited this time with a song called *Bewitched* from Pal Joey, certainly the audience became bewitched by Mark's superb harmonies and progressions all executed with unbelievable skill and passion at the pianoforte.

Back to the Wurlitzer with Babes in Arms which preceded Lady is a Tramp played uptempo of course, then reducing the pace for Where or When which was presented as a slow ballad in soft tones. Johnny One Note segued into My Funny Valentine with soft strings and tibias with the second chorus featuring the melody in the left hand, slowly building into a stylistic climax with an interesting harmonic progression.

Johnny Green's immortal Body and Soul (once banned on the radio) followed, featuring tibias and tuba in the bass line creating a wistful mood with the organist thumbing on the lower manual with other fingers on the top manual, at the same time playing tricky chord progressions and concluding with a glissando. A comedy number was to follow, titled Makin' it to class on time. After the school bell was heard, the tempo became helter skelter, almost bedlam and finishing without a second to spare. To conclude the first half Mark selected *Tiger Rag*, the first time through with subdued registrations, then crescendo, suddenly trems off and wow! after a phrase of Jingle Bells, fasten your seatbelts for a wild rythm also jumping from keyboard to keyboard right through to the fantastic finish. One may have wondered if the organist had enough energy left to play the second half.

After intermission (Mark is an American) we settled down to a wide selection of songs including; Put on a Happy Face (Bye, Bye Birdie), My Romance (Rogers and Hart) played softly and expressively with the second chorus featured on the Vibraphone. Then a Jules Styne bracket which included, Some People (Gypsy) which displayed Mark's incredible improvisation skills, then Saturday Night is the Lonliest Night of the Week, People and Everythings Coming

up Roses.

Another controversial song in it's day was *Love for Sale*, and Mark captured the style in a raunchy, sleazy interpretation. Who said the Wurlitzer didn't fit into today's lifestyle?

Mark then returned to the Grand Piano for what was to prove to be the surprise of the afternoon. He announced that he would play one of his own compositions, a Piano Rhapsody. No one could have been prepared for the incredible talent unleashed in the virtuoso performance of a classical masterpiece. To liken his work with something familiar would be to compare it with Rachmaninov as it was more similar to that composer than any other, yet nothing was copied. It contained two major themes that were totally original and could stand up to the best composer's works. The composition was extremely advanced and takes a highly skilled pianist to do it justice. It is a piano piece for a virtuoso pianist. Of course it was rewarded with thunderous applause. In private conversation with Mark some time later, I commented to the effect, had I been him, I would consider further developing and extending the composition, adding orchestral accompaniment and turning it into a piano concerto. His response was ' if I did that I would have to think of a third theme'. I further remarked that he obviously managed to compose the first two themes. Time will tell, but I do sincerely hope it receives the recognition it duly deserves.

Back at the Wurlitzer, Mark concluded the performance with a Duke Ellington selection; Beginning to see the Light, Caravan (obviously travelling very fast), I got it bad and that ain't good, Don't get around much any more, Take the A train (which speeded up and was accompanied by the drums). This bracket highlighted Mark's skills as a competent jazz musician.

Two encores followed;

Alone together - Dietz and Schwartz

Roller Coaster - T.V. Show Theme

After all these exceptional demonstrations of his skills as a Theatre Organist, Jazz Musician, Pianist and Composer it is unbelievable that Mark is only 21 years of age. If this is just the start of his musical career, where is he going from here? Another Jerry Herman or Rachmaninov? Mark please hurry back!

"ORION REPORT" to Annual General Meeting 15/11/2009

The Orion Wurlitzer continued to give good service through the past year. I can only recall two ciphers, and one of those was a short time after Sydney had been blanketed by a horrendous dust storm. I am not an expert in such matters, so who knows?

An important and very welcome event this year was the installation of a new back-stage organ computer together with a new-style UNIFLEX circuit board from USA. Of course it didn't all go smoothly, and it took a while to work out that the new board was faulty. We were able to borrow a replacement board from Neil Jensen, and with Roger Dunk's expertise we were up and running again in time for the next concert. A replacement board has been ordered.

Another thing - Rob Gliddon (with John Andrews' help) removed the Chrysoglott from the organ chamber and Rob drove it to Victoria to consult with Julien Arnold. By the time you read/hear this report the Chrysoglott should have been thoroughly re-conditioned and modified so it can operate the machinery which transforms it into a Vibraphone. (Keep your ears open!).

Please accept this report as an invitation for you to come and have a play of the Wurlitzer on one of the "Members' Play" afternoons. Even if you only get to play for a short time you will enjoy the company of other TOSA members and you won't easily forget the experience. The dates and details of these Players' afternoons are regularly printed in TOSA News.

Cliff Bingham asked the question re: consider looking at easier ways for our membership to become involved with ATOS, obtaining their magazine and making way for parallel membership all at the one time. After general discussion it was decided to take it back to Committee for further investigation.

Robert Gliddon asked the question; he would like the meeting to indicate ...how much interest there would be in holding a Convention at Easter time in 2010 to celebrate our 50th anniversary since inauguration 6th January 1960. were owed some accountability and suggested the new format TOSA (News) should carry progress reports.

Geoff Brimley replied that the planning of a National Logo was ongoing, overseas artists and costs were also discussed. On a national level there is acknowledgment that there is a problem between states; SA and WA are run differently to us, and we need to adapt to some of their ways of thinking.

There are no common solutions and we have to push forward and look to ourselves.

We have 2 good organs, a viable society, we might be aging but need to attract some young people as well.

John Shaw – Mentioned the Promotional team, Advertising TOSA in many ways, and the purchase of a new Laser Colour Printer.

Peter Held - Mentioned Ticket stubs, new Web-Site, Tramway Museum's profit, suggestion that we use some of Ian Hanson's methods, more openness now, but privacy and confidentiality should be reduced. John Shaw mentioned that TOSA's name is in the Sydney telephone directory.

Geoff Brimley – Privacy - there is a very strong privacy legislation in Australia and we have to abide by it.

Advertising – Local and Overseas artists are being approached to now have a theme for their concerts and supply a list of what they will be playing.

David Parson's concert – 99 paying customers – 13 non payers = small profit

Neil Jensen's concert -- = \$2000 profit

John Andrews - Mentioned the web-site and suggested we give a vote of thanks to Roger Dunk for recent excellent work.

Marrickville Organ Report for Annual General Meeting November 2009

During 2009 a couple of secondary pneumatics in the Tibia manual chest needed releathering and I am hoping that the remainder of these can be done towards the end of the year/beginning of the new-year. While this is happening the organ will probably be unavailable for use while the wind circuit is opened up. Apart from this the instrument has given good service throughout the year.

Enhancements

From about 1929, Wurlitzer equipped many of their pipe organ Chrysoglott's with the Vibraphone effect (the State theatre Wurlitzer is so equipped). The Vibraphone effect is achieved by rotating paddles in each of the Chrysoglott's 49 resonators.

When the Marrickville console was refurbished in the mid 90's with a revised stop list, provision was made for a Vibraphone stop tab. The Vibraphone project for Marrickville has now commenced. A few months ago the resonators (horizontal tubes in photo) were taken down to Julien Arnold's factory in Melbourne by Robert Gliddon where stage one of the project was to cut a channel through the resonators in readiness for a shaft which will have the paddles attached. The resonators and bars were put back just in time for Mark Herman's concert so that all of the organ's resources would be available to him, particularly on a smaller instrument. While working on the Chrysoglott it was noticed that the covering on the hammer pneumatics were beginning to show signs of deterioration. These had been covered some 30 - 40 years ago in a material that was known in the Player Piano industry as wine motor cloth (because of its colour). Robert Gliddon has volunteered to recover the



pneumatics using Kangaroo skin (will it give them more "bounce"?)The entire Chrysoglott will need to be removed from the chamber for the commencement of the other stages of the project. The opportunity was also taken to cut a channel in the Orion Wurlitzer's Chrysoglott resonators for a future Vibraphone project on that instrument.

Discussions are taking place with Grahame Davis of Pipe Organ Artisans of Arizona, Inc. regarding improving the performance of the Marrickville instrument.

Thank you to Christopher Waterhouse, John Weismantel and Robert Gliddon for helping me with the Marrickville maintenance during the year and to Walter Pearce who organises the access for the tuner.

The Chrysoglott produces a sound similar to the Celesta in an orchestra.


