Marrickville Organ Report October 2022

Report of an intermittent cipher on Diaphone note D# which became more persistent. At the September 4th Monday group playing event I was able to replicate the cipher. The cause was a deteriorated magnet cap gasket causing the armature to touch the metal body of the magnet base when energised rather than being separated by the gasket. The residual magnetism was sufficient to prevent the wind from blowing the armature back into the magnet cap when the note was released. I replaced the gasket and the players event was able to proceed.

Still pending investigation is a string celeste cipher but the pipe has been lifted as a temporary stop gap.

ORION RESTORATION REPORT

Excellent progress has been made over the past two months on Stage One of the Orion Water Damage insurance work.

Wooden wind trunks/conveyances, split and damaged due to submergence in water have been fully repaired, and sealed.

The 8 note CCC# side chest of the 16' Tibia bass pipes has been fully refurbished.

New felt and leather has been fitted to all pallet valves.

Note primary action blocks have been sanded flat to correct warping due to dampness, and gaskets attended to.

All parts of this Stage are ready for re-installation at the Orion.

Next will begin Stage Two.

Regrettably as we now work with a leasee, we do not have the run of the place we had back in the 1990's, Everything has to be co-ordinated to fit with available storage space. The work has been fitted into 'blocks' – as one stage is completed, the next is moved into the space occupied by the first.

As many will realise, the organ chambers are very cramped, and much time is taken to carefully disconnect and remove large pipes, thus enabling the water damaged chest parts to be removed.

I'm very grateful to those members who have been 'on deck' to do the heavy stuff, and those who have been able to transport parts to my workshop.

Water damage to a pipe organ is not as "final" as fire but left in a damp water-logged situation for a number of months can be almost as 'catastrophic' to the timber parts and actions.

Thankfully the TOSA team was on the ball, and with help from Canterbury/Bankstown Council, wet-vacuumed and dried out the chamber as quickly as possible.

I'm looking forward to starting Stage Two of the restoration work.

BOOK LAUNCH RAISES STATE WURLITZER!

SYDNEY by Ian Hanson. Photos by Barry Tooker.

"Sorry! House Full" is the title of a new book on the history of cinema going in the City of Sydney. It is a substantial writing consisting of some 224 pages with many colour illustrations combined with a large amount of text. The book contains the history of nearly 104 cinemas.

When it comes to theatre organs, there are some interesting photographs including one of Ian Davies at the Capitol Theatre Wurlitzer. In addition to several other images of the Regent Theatre Wurlitzer, Prince Edward etc. Also, there is a rather interesting photo of the Estey organ in the old Crystal Palace Theatre, which once stood in George Street.


The authors of this work are Les Tod O.A.M. and Ian Hanson, both well- known writers of cinema history over nearly four decades. Each of the theatres is listed in alphabetical order with details of seating capacity and location including which theatres had organs and which builder.

Ian Hanson was not planning on having a book launch owing to the closure of a number of venues as a result of Covid. It was planned to release the book without fanfare as only a limited number of books were published.


A chance meeting with the State Theatre management in July would change the situation completely. After a few meetings with senior management, an offer was received to hold the book launch in the State Theatre complete with the recently restored State Wurlitzer organ.

The launch of "Sorry! House Full" took place on Monday morning August 29. The use of the organ was a last-minute decision and resulted in Margaret Hall being the organist for the ceremony. The audience of about 70 guests were treated to the wonderful sounds of the State mighty Wurlitzer. After some speeches and interview with Ian Hanson, the audience were allowed to tour the State Theatre whilst Margaret played the Wurlitzer for an hour or so. A very historic occasion indeed.

Ian Hanson, Centre, at Book Launch, State Theatre, Sydney





Continued from September 2022 TOSA News An excerpt from The Encyclopedia of American Theatre Organ Volume 3 by Preston J. Kaufmann

THE UNIT ORCHESTRA FLOUNDERS: September To December 1912

FW to RHJ in Manhattan, November 12, 1912: "This morning to my surprise, Mr. Kelly telephoned me and told me that he had received the following telegram from you: 'Will send McSpadden to Syracuse Wednesday night. Am finding it impossible to secure player. Telephone me Hotel Martinique, New York, Tuesday 1 O'clock. I think I had better meet their own musician in Syracuse Thursday and teach him to play the instrument.'

"I could not understand why you should telegraph Mr. Kelly and not reply to my telegram that I sent you yesterday. Mr. Kelly felt and I felt, that it was urgent that this matter should be attended to at once and not let it go until Wednesday night or Thursday, and we therefore started Mr. Marr off immediately to Syracuse, and I telephoned Mr. Grimes to tell you not to send McSpadden. No doubt he delivered the message to you. I also told him to do everything possible to get a man to play the instrument because unless we start this instrument off right on Friday, it certainly will be a failure, even if we do get another man by Sunday or Monday that will play it right--it is the first impression that counts.

"Several hours after I attended to these things, I received your wire reading as follows: 'Wrote you last night. Have Syracuse situation in hand. Will not fall down on it.'

"Now this afternoon I have received your letter and Mr. Kelly also advised me that you phoned his office at Rochester, stating that it was impossible for you to secure a player and that you will go to Syracuse and try to break in the man they have there.

"I wired Chicago this morning to see whether they had a man that they could send on, but have not had an answer, and I doubt whether we can get anybody, because the only man they probably had to spare has no doubt been sent to Kansas City for the Moving Picture Show Convention there, and from your letter I see that Dr. Ronfort is going to play the Cort Theatre instrument beginning with Sunday night.

"I think it is best we keep Marr in Syracuse for next week to be sure that everything will go right so far as the mechanical parts of the instrument are concerned. When Mr. Marr played the instrument here in the Erecting Room, he usually played it very well with the music rolls. Of course, if you are there, you can do this and do it very effectively, so that even if we haven't a good man to play the instrument, we may make a success of it through the music rolls.

"Yesterday we sent 20 rolls to Syracuse we thought would be effective for the instrument. Of course, the rolls that sound best cannot be used for skating. They can only be used in between times. We have sent rolls with dance music on them for the skating and these are the ones that will have to be used for that purpose.

"As soon as you get to Syracuse and know what the situation there is, you can let me know whether you want McQuarrie to go down there. . . . if we cannot get anyone to play it satisfactorily, this would be the best thing to do. Wouldn't it be possible for Houze to come back to the Statler sooner than Sunday? I hope that the demonstration at the Martinique will prove a success and that this matter will be settled definitely and not left in any indefinite shape.

"In regard to your thinking that the instrument has gotten out of order in Syracuse since McSpadden left, this is not the case When the Style J was here it played any 65-note roll and repeated properly, according to what Mr. Marr says.

"In regard to the heater, I understand that the ones at New York were sent up there . . . but the people from whom we ordered the other heater returned our order, stating that they did not make any for alternating current. We telegraphed them and wrote them to send what they had, but so far we have had no reply to our telegram or letter. We wired them on Saturday." *RHJ in Manhattan to FW, November 13, 1912:* "Yours of 12th just to hand. I am sorry that rush of other pressing matters prevented my writing as fully to you as I should have done.

"I thought that as you had put the Syracuse matter in my hands you would be sure I would not fall down on it but would see it through satisfactorily. After failing to get a GOOD man used to playing for skaters and dancers I thought (and still think) it the best plan to train the excellent musician they have and who they say is up in exactly the kind of music they require--to play the Style J. This I could easily have done tomorrow. I phoned Mr. Kelly to make sure he would be there to meet me. I also would have seen to the instrument working its best.

"As your wire to Mr. Grimes shows you have sent Marr and a musician from Chicago, I do not feel there is a need for me to go to Syracuse. I will however put in a call there on my way home. . ."

FW to RHJ in Syracuse, November 14, 1912: "I have your several letters in regard to the Martinique instrument, also, in regard to the instrument at Syracuse. Be sure and stay long enough in Syracuse to see that the man that is being sent from Chicago is all right, because we do not want to take any chances of falling down there. . . ."

RHJ at factory to FW, November 18, 1912: "... This morning I wrote Mr. Uhl regarding the manner of playing the Style J instrument for demonstrating purposes. If you and he think well, perhaps the letter might be passed to Dr. Ronfort and to others who demonstrate.

"I am glad to learn the Chicago House has organized a class for players of these smaller instruments, such as Style H and J. They require an entirely different grade of men to those who are willing to make a success of the Unit Orchestras. . . ."
