Orion Lift report

Wednesday February 12 saw a slightly earlier Orion members' day scheduled due to an event booking for our usual day in February. A small number of members arrived to find there was a slight delay. The recent rain of the previous week or so had once again seeped into the lift shaft in the basement. An existing pump that was in the lift shaft had failed. Fortunately the water did not overflow the shaft and therefore had not affected the organ.

The water had mostly naturally subsided and plumbers and electricians were just finishing their work to install a new automatically activated pump that will keep the sump dry. Anyway, to get the day underway we loaded the Wurlitzer piano onto the lift and sent it up to the stage - at which point the lift control system decided that was it for the day. Fortunately a council officer was on site to inspect work that was happening and he was quickly onto the lift technicians to get them on site to fix the lift.

To cut a long story short, the lift technicians were soon on site and were able to manually operate the lift and we could put the piano back in the garage, pack up and leave. By the time you read this the lift will be repaired and we will be able to get the Wurlitzer console and piano out for the March concert.

In good news, while we were waiting for the lift technicians I was able to run the blower up and start the Uniflex computer. We were able to playback previous pieces from concerts and a smorgasbord of performers we've had at Campsie over the years entertained us for an hour or so - and the system never missed a beat!

Christie report for March 2020 TOSA News.

Work done over the period from end of 2019 to early 2020 includes:

Accompaniment chamber:

- The custom manufactured regulator for the Orchestral Oboe has been completed with new springs installed, and adjusted for the required 6" water gauge pressure. Adjustments to the Oboe chest action are continuing. Adjustments are also continuing to the Oboe tremulant which is proving difficult to tame.
- Since tuning by John Parker the Clarinet has gone badly out of tune and regulation with recent weather extremes. John will be consulted soon about future stability.
- Work has commenced on wind lines for the three tremulants in this chamber.

Solo chamber:

• A winker (pulse absorber) regulator was installed on the front wall of the Solo chamber to supply the shutters and tuned Seigh Bells. Improved springing was needed to achieve the required15" w.g. pressure. With air available it was found that the Sleigh Bell unit required further work; only 3 notes operated. The unit was uninstalled and is in process of rebuild. During rebuild the unit wiring will be modified to allow re-iteration control via the Uniflex system for improved future reliability. Unfortunately removal of the Sleigh Bells has delayed installation of three regulators to supply the Vox, Tibia, & Tuba/Krumet due to limited access space.

• Commenced installation of air line to pressure switch (to start computer and power supplies after blower up to speed).

General:

- A second-hand evaporative cooler was purchased to humidify blower input air when required and has helped on low humidity days.
- More wind lines have been painted in both chambers.
- New regulator spring pegs (sourced from Brisbane) sanded, drilled and shellacked.
- More tremulants being restored, including manufacture of missing inlet gates.
- Ladder for Orch Oboe access measured and trimmed to length. In process of installation.

Simon Ellis is a native of Sydney, and has a background in Philosophy, English, Law and Theology.

After initial piano studies from the age of 6, he studied organ with Robert Broughall and then with the late Eric Smith. He served as Assistant Organist to Eric at Wesley Central Mission for 6 years, and was regularly heard playing the Christie theatre organ in the Lyceum Theatre, playing for both church services, and before and after movies.

Simon was Organist/ Choirmaster at Northmead Uniting Church for 9 years until the early 1980's, and concurrently Director of Music at a large reception venue, Fairfield House, at Windsor. He also served several years as Associate Music Director for the Sydney Touring Theatre Company, and was Director of the highly successful Blue Mountains Consort for 6 years until 1998.

Simon has performed in both theatre and classical organ venues in many parts of Australia, America, Britain, and Europe. He has accompanied many singers, both in Australia and overseas, and also studied singing with the late Florence Taylor. He was for many years affiliated with the Royal School of Church Music, and is currently in his 15th year as Senior Staff Organist for a large Sydney church.

Glenn Amer is featured as a Headline Entertainer on the Regent, Cunard, Royal Caribbean, Silversea, Celebrity, Crystal, Norwegian, Orient, Princess, Holland America, NHK, Saga, Oceania and Seabourn cruise lines. Touring with these companies has taken him all over the world and, extensively, throughout Australia. His Liberace style of piano playing has proved extremely popular with audiences who are also impressed with his Robert Goulet/Mario Lanza style singing.

Encompassed in **Glenn's** repertoire is a wide-ranging variety of styles. Whether playing a major Bach organ work or a popular song by Burt Bacharach, he is equally at home!

2015 was filled with international and Australian tours, as well as new recordings which were released early 2016.

State Theatre Wurlitzer (Style 270SP, Opus 2005)

The State Wurlitzer Returns! by Chris Styles Photos Barry Tooker



Well, we've waited for years to see the 4/21 Wurli rise from the depths of the State Theatre Sydney and at last on Sunday 9th February, up it came in all its glory.

So wonderful to walk through that magnificent foyer and on to the grand staircase which we passed on our way to the Stalls. I think I last heard the Wurlitzer in its then poor condition in 1973 at a TOSA convention.

A goodly number of TOSA and OMSS members – 320 to be precise – graced the Stalls for the grand reopening of this magnificent instrument.

After a short introduction by TOSA President Craig Keller, our own Cliff Bingham brought the console up with the "*Stein Song*", a fine reintroduction to that wonderful sound of a Mighty Wurlitzer, so at home in a real picture theatre.



Cliff continued with a medley of songs which included Lyn Larsen's composition "*Stanley*", "*Music of the night*" from Phantom of the Opera, and from Eric Coates London Suite – "*Covent Garden*" which is when we first chance heard and felt the magnificent 32' rank of pipes from under the floor of the auditorium.



We also learnt how to clear a cipher when Cliff lent on two of the four manuals a couple of times and the cipher disappeared. Must try that next time I am at a pipe organ that ciphers!

The pipe chambers of the organ are of course high above the proscenium so there could be some thought of the best place to sit in that theatre to get the best sound from the instrument eg stalls, mezzanine lounge or the dress circle. Here's hoping we all have many opportunities to visit the Sate in future to try all the different areas. *Editors Note - the best place to hear the Wurlitzer is in the Dress Circle so that you are reasonably high up and facing the chambers.*

A note of nostalgia for those "of a certain age". Who, like me on their regular trips "into town" in the Fifties and early Sixties visited the State Newsreel Theatrette for an hour's break or so from shopping? Of course, the theatrette has long since ceased to show newsreels.



Next was Titus Grenyer, one of Sydney's very fine young organists who commenced his bracket with "*Washington Post*", a march by J P Sousa. Another chance to feel the 32' rank. Knowing Titus's talents on the organ in the classical genre, it was delightful to see him completely at home at a theatre organ. Next came Billy Mayerl's "*Autumn Crocus*" - as grown in the garden of Chinoiserie in the Southern Highlands (soon to be sold as the owners downsize!). Simon Gledhill on one of his recordings also made a fine version of this sweet number.



Titus also included W A Mozart's "*Rondo Alla Turca"* and concluded his segment with his own composition especially for the State Wurlitzer reopening, "*Back to the Twenties"*. Thank you Titus for your creating a musical tribute to the instrument that was at the height of its popularity in the 1920's.



Last, but not least, Simon Ellis had his time at the console of this magnificent sounding instrument. He commenced with two tunes "Great Day" and "This could be the start of something big" intermingled together. Following this we had the 1936 melody "Poinciana". Simon is a great fan of American organist Ashley Miller (Miller's style is wonderful!) and from 1951 "Non Dimenticar" which Nat King Cole also made famous (again for those of us of a certain age!).

Everett Nourse at the San Francis Fox made a great arrangement of "*Slow Poke"* and this sweet little tune sounded delightful on our "newest" Sydney Wurlitzer. Lastly a Neapolitan Medley to take the organ down into the pit and this included "*Matinata"*, "*Santa Lucia" and* "O Sole Mio".

What a joy to see this Wurlitzer take a small turn before descending into the pit. Hopefully those organists who graced the console of this instrument from its early days in 1929 are looking joyfully down from above!

Grateful thanks go to the management of the State Theatre for allowing we organ tragics a delightful afternoon, and with a sincere hope that we will all be back in there before long to hear another burst of theatre organ music in that wonderful picture palace.

Thank you also to the State Theatre management - in particular General Manager Mark Harris for making the event possible. We hope to see more events using the Wurlitzer at the State in future. We'll let you know what's happening as we find out.

Last but not least, thank you to all the TOSA members, OMSS members and especially those who travelled from interstate to be at this special event.

Changes to members day at the Orion for March

This month TOSA(NSW) has again had to bring forward the usual second-Thursday-of-the-month meeting. This time it's a double change, from a Thursday to a Wednesday and from the usual second Thursday to the first Wednesday of the month. So, as a one-off event on Wednesday, March 4th we will meet at the usual 10.30 am time at The Orion, Beamish Street, Campsie. The 3-17 Wurlitzer (Op. No. 1813) plus piano should be ready (fingers crossed!) for play by 10.30 a.m. I should mention that last month players were stymied by water at the bottom of the hoist-well; a new float mechanism has now been installed so that a pump should function properly even if water accumulates.

Tea & coffee will be provided as usual, but please bring something to munch on if you can.

Please enter by one of the doors in the north side overlooking the car-park behind the building and NOT through the glass front-doors (pictured above). Reminder: Orion management has asked TOSA to avoid using the front door entirely for security reasons.

Once more the TOSA Library boxes should be available for returning or loaning sheet music and/or albums.

Remember to sign the TOSA Insurance Book soon after you arrive; this record is for your own protection as well as the Society's.

Yet again it should be mentioned that socially-inclined members are particularly encouraged to attend. Limited but free parking is available both behind the Orion Centre and on adjacent streets.

The Orion is about 4 minutes' walk north & downhill from Campsie railway station on Beamish Street. Many buses (including the 400 – Burwood to Bondi Junction) serve Beamish Street with a stop (if travelling from the north) just south of the theatre and on the same side as The Orion. North-travelling buses along Beamish Street (i.e. coming from the south, e.g. Rockdale), stop on the west side of the street and within sight of the Orion.

BTW: Looking ahead into March, I should remark that well-known organist **Hector Olivera** is advertised to play a free concert at Sydney Town Hall 12.30-1.30 p.m. on Monday 23rd March.
