# **TOSA National Presidents' Meeting April 2016**

From Secretary Craig Keller who represented NSW Division

On the weekend of 9/10 April I represented TOSA NSW Inc on behalf of President Geoff Brimley at the TOSA National Presidents' Meeting hosted by TOSA Vic in Melbourne.

There were some great discussion points during the day long meeting on Saturday 9th covering a broad range of topics including marketing - during which Brett Kavanagh (Secretary TOSA Q) made a fantastic presentation about improvements they have made to marketing using new methods and channels and the improvement in number and type of audience.

Brett also discussed the national Register of Cultural Organisations - a way of organisations such as TOSA achieving a status that enables us to attract donations (private and corporate) with a tax deductible status for the donor.

We reviewed recent international touring artists and also discussed and refined a shortlist for international artists for 2017. John Fuhrman from Perth was tasked with approaching the short-listed artists to assess their availability for next year.

We also discussed ways that we may support and encourage Australian based professional theatre organists and further work is happening in this area.

The day's meeting, combined with lively discussion over dinner gave all participants much to think about and encouraged us all to endeavour to work more closely together to support our respective societies in the promotion of Theatre Organ.

# **Christie Organ Report May 2016**

The hammers on the Marimba unit have been recovered with very hard felt kindly donated by John Parker. Mounting the unit high up near the chamber ceiling and the hard felt have made the sound in the Church most acceptable.

Three Diaphones, two 8' Diapasons and various 8' Viol d' Orchestre

pipes have been received back from Melbourne and the Diaphones/ Diapasons have been refinished in grey.

Tim Gilley has repaired the damaged manual Tuba pipes and these are ready for collection in Melbourne.

The Piano vacuum pump has been stripped down and all felts replaced. This should save some money when we have to pay to have the flap valves and the motor coverings replaced.

Monday morning will see the manual Tuba chest delivered to John Parker's workshop so the pipes can be racked in. This procedure is not straightforward due to hooding & knuckling but the safest place to store this rank is in its chest.

An article from Theatre Organ March/April 2016 Chapter News - **Norcal** by Roy K. Powlan Tom Madsen, Chairman

Berkley, California -- In the early morning light of November 8, NorCal Concert Master Chris Nichols powered up one of the twin and balanced 20-hp blowers in the basement of Berkley Community Theatre, thereby commencing a day of music and friendship that has rarely been matched in the history of this chapter. That afternoon NorCal hosted a concert presentation by the incomparable Mark Herman.

The very large audience had every right to anticipate a moving and thoughtfully designed program of dance, theatre and light music from this master of harmony, and was amply rewarded with every musical gem which Mark gifted us. The superlatives surrounding Mark's performances are all true and inadequate to convey the high level of craftsmanship and artistry expressed in his playing. His tastefully composed registrations brought forth a subtle, quiet beauty from our 4/41 Wurlitzer in its three massive overhead proscenium chambers -- and then shook the very walls with the 32' Wood Diaphones for thrilling effect.

Adding to the day's delights was Mark himself. A very young man, he has the poise and effortless charm of the best-seasoned performers in any art. Working without notes, his introductions were brief yet informative, illuminating some interesting points of history, sometimes general, often personal, that brought the audience ever

deeper into his creative thought process. The audience itself contributed mightily to the joyous afternoon, filled with luminaries of the theatre organ world such as Jim Riggs, Ed Stout, Dick Taylor, and Geoff Hansen, all graciously welcomed by our NorCal Master of Ceremonies Bill Schlotter, who oversees and perfects every aspect of every concert -- from the tuning and maintenance of this most magnificent of Wurlitzer Unit Orchestras to the lighting of the stage curtains and illuminated organ platform. The soft voices of old friends in the vast stagehouse afterwards ended this perfect day.

"Chris Powell was born in Manchester in 1971. At the age of 2, his parents emigrated to live in Christchurch, New Zealand where he first became exposed to organ music as a pre-schooler at the Cathedral Boys Grammar School in this most 'English' of cities. By the age of 16, he was already giving concerts as well as playing for dancing around East Lancashire and West Yorkshire and had his first Club Residency during this time. Growing up in North West England, it was perhaps not surprising that it wasn't to be long before the family made an outing to the world famous Blackpool

Tower for a visit. Upon entering the hallowed Ballroom there and hearing the Wurlitzer, Chris remarked to his parents that he would "play in here some day!".... Although met with some wry laughter at the time, he did indeed do this and at the age of 18, he was successfully auditioned to join the team of organists there as a relief player during the winter of 1990. A happy 5 year connection ensued, playing both the Wurlitzer and also electronics within the complex.

His time at Blackpool saw him playing in front of some fairly prestigious figures including former Labour Party Leader, Neil Kinnoch and also Princess Anne. It was during this time that invitations started to come in from far and wide for him to play for both concerts and dances alike. 1991 saw his debut for Sceptre Promotions at the Keyboard Cavalcade Festival in Blackpool, with his name now firmly established with the keyboard loving public from then onwards. 1994 saw an invitation to return to New Zealand to play a series of theatre and electronic organ concerts in the land that was once home to him and his family. The 4 week sell-out tour saw him performing to capacity crowds from Dunedin in the South right up to Auckland.

Chris remains one of the most popular performers on the UK concert circuit with a full diary of dates stretching some 2 years ahead."



# REVIEW OF TONY FENELON'S AUTUMN CONCERT ORION CENTRE CAMPSIE 17TH APRIL 2016

The name Tony Fenelon obviously means a lot to Sydney audiences, because the roll-up at the Orion Centre amazed the Management Committee of TOSA (NSW) and cheered all and sundry to see many familiar faces not seen at TOSA concerts for quite some time. But the cheeriest face of all was that of our artist of the day, Tony Fenelon (OAM). Tony made the first of two 'pilgrimages' from Melbourne for 2016, but on this occasion to perform 'a-solo'. However, even the description of 'a-solo' wasn't strictly correct, because for many of his items, he was performing on the piano whilst being accompanied - **by himself**, on the organ. Yes, once again we were being amazed by information technology's ability to 'record' the 'behaviour' of the organ, enabling it to be 'subsequently played back for later checking, archiving, or as an accompaniment to Tony performing on the grand piano – a sort of 21st century pianola.

In the typical Fenelon 'joie de vie' manner, Tony kicked off his performance with ('It's Gonna be a) Great Day', a song written in 1929 by Vincent Youmans – a great show-starter, and a winner from Paul Whiteman through to the present day. He took a few minutes for the benefit of newcomers to the theatre organ, to describe the 'nature of the beast', and it's computer interface.



Repeating a piece which I had previously heard Tony perform at the celebrated Melbourne Town Hall/Regent Theatre concert in November 2014, the next item was Tony's own transcription of Bedrich Smetana's the 'Dance of the Comedians' from the comic opera 'The Bartared Bride'. This piece displayed dazzling fingering and a pleasing recreation of the orchestral scoring. By way of acknowledging the enthusiastic response of the audience, Tony utilised the microphone as an 'aspergillum' – look it up!!!

Then came one of the many 'pieces de resistance' of the afternoon, which drew upon the assistance of the crew responsible for the video projection equipment which is ordinarily monitoring the artist's manipulation' of the keyboards, tabs, pistons and pedals. Tony reminded the audience of the era of Cinerama and in particular, the first film of the series, 'This is Cinerama', released in 1952. The projection crew 'fed' a conventional video-format copy of an item in the original 'This is Cinerama' production which featured a circuit of the Queens New York City's 'Rockaway's Playland' roller coaster. Tony explained that he was able to synchronise his performance of the original sound-track music, titled 'Rollercoaster', by using an earpiece reproducing the sound-track of the film, and 'simply' playing along!! A most impressive performance to match a most impressive ride.



Remaining with an equally spectacular movie series, 'Starwars', Tony played a number of themes from the composer John Williams' memorable sound-track, which included the 'Opening Theme', the plaintive leitmotif 'Princess Leia's Theme', and the Elgarish 'Processional' from near the conclusion of the first in the series.

Tony recalled Karen Carpenter as being "a real sweetheart with a voice like a musical instrument". He was referring to Karen as being the voice that popularised Neil Sedaka's composition 'Solitaire'. He chose that particular item because it was one of the musical collaborations he had with the late lamented Ray Thornley. Tony and Ray included 'Solitaire' on their 1987 recording 'Black and White'. It also provided the 'vehicle' on this occasion for Tony to migrate to the piano and to utilise the computer-driven accompaniment from the organ, with Ray Thornley's arrangement. This recreation, to this reviewer, was the highlight of the program, displaying sensitivity and impeccable playing and organ registrations.

From the sublime to the (not really) ridiculous, Tony introduced the first of two Tom and Jerry cartoons, the first being 'Tom and Jerry – in the Hollywood Bowl', made in 1950. The orchestra (organ) strikes up with Franz Liszt's 'Les Preludes' whilst Tom attired in evening wear, takes up his position on the rostrum and commences conducting a strangely all-Tom-lookalike orchestra. Shortly after the introduction to Johann Strauss' 'Die Fledermaus', a similarly attired Jerry appears out of his miniature Hollywood Bowl mouse-hole at stage-right – and proceeds to take-over the conducting function – much to Tom's chagrin – with predictable results. Tony was again monitoring the original sound-track through ear pieces, and brilliantly recreated the sound track on the organ in perfect synchronism. It's amazing how simple he makes the process appear – but we know better!!

Another great recreation, but this time from the artistry of the wonderful US organist Buddy Cole, a one-time accompanist for Bing Crosby and Rosemary Clooney. From Buddy's 1963 LP 'Modern Pipe Organ', Tony unerringly recreated Buddy Coles' version of Le-Roy Anderson's 'Serenata'. This is one of Buddy Cole's most orchestrally-fascinating pieces of the theatre organ

literature, beautifully reproduced by Tony.

Ferrante and Teicher were a latter-day 'manifestation' of the duo-pianists Rawicz and Landauer. Amongst the many movie themes which they recorded during the 1950's through to the '80's, was the theme from the 1960 movie 'Exodus'. Complete with all of the extravagances of Ferrante and Teicher performances, Tony's closing number before interval was another 'collaboration' between himself on piano and his digital 'equivalent' on the organ.

Tony commenced his post-interval program suggesting how magical it would be, if 'Tinker Bell' could control the organ. A 'magical' outburst from the unmanned organ, necessitated a dash by Tony to the piano to 'participate' in several reminders of the music of Disney productions, beginning with a theme associated with a key attraction at Walt Disney's Disneyland, 'It's a Small World', written by the Sherman Brothers (in 1962). Then came a reminder of the 'Theme from the Mickey Mouse Club' and a brief appearance of 'When You Wish Upon a Star'. Somehow, with the assistance of the TOSA 'crew, the organ had been 'tinkered' with.

A particularly charming piece, not usually associated with the theatre organ repertoire, was Tony's next item 'Caprice Viennois', composed by the violinist Fritz Kreisler. A little set-back occurred when a planned appearance of the piano, as a part of the 'Caprice Viennois', failed to occur. Few in the audience would have been aware, because such is the Fenelon expertise, that he overcame the 'tinkering' by substituting for the errant piano. However, a speedy exit by Craig Keller to backstage, restored the 'puff' needed to force the piano to cooperate being played from the keyboards of the organ. Accordingly, Tony gave due praise to the TOSA 'crew' responsible for the video system and the organ/piano's computer control.

Fritz Kreisler had another 'outing' with 'Schon Rosmarin' ('Beautiful Rosemary') which as well as being a delightful little piece in its own right, also enabled Tony to confirm the restoration of the piano to its being able to be played from the organ. Some remarkable dexterity was observed as Tony involved the piano by simultaneously playing on two manuals with the right hand.

A medley of a number of the British bandleader and composer Ray Noble's favourites followed, commencing with 'Love is the Sweetest Thing', an up-tempo arrangement of 'Cherokee', a brief segué into the contrasting 'A Touch of Your Lips', then 'Love is the Sweetest Thing'. Ray Nobles' signature tune, 'The Very Thought of You' followed, then 'Goodnight Sweetheart', a number one hit for Guy Lombardo in the USA, and finally a 'big-finish' return for 'Cherokee' and 'Love is the Sweetest Thing'.

A brief pause was called for whilst 'Tony the Organ Builder' carried out some essential modifications to a stop that wouldn't go off!! Problem solved with a Biro, and it was on with the show.

Quiz time as Tony posed the question, "Who composed the following... 'The Theme from Limelight', 'This is my Song' and 'Smile'? A know-all in the audience piped up with 'Charlie Chaplin'! Tony proceeded to the 'one manual organ' as he called it (aka the piano) to commence an arrangement of the late-lamented Bob Docker which was titled 'Limelight on Chaplin'. The piano accompaniment featured some stunning arpeggios and generally concerto-like brilliance, a genre not at all unfamiliar to Tony.

To reinforce his enjoyment of Robert (Bob) Docker's compositions, Tony played a spritely little 4/4 number 'Tabarinage', meaning 'Buffoonery', (a number Tony and John Atwell have played as duets on a couple of occasions). The choice of this item also enabled a reappearance of the piano controlled from the organ.

Another Buddy Cole arrangement, but this time from a transcription made by TOSA (NSW)'s Patron John Atwell, from a 1964 Buddy Cole LP album called 'Autumn Nocturne'. 'When the Leaves are Turning' was the product of John Atwell's skilful transcription which incorporated many of the wonderful registrations and performing characteristics of Buddy Cole. As with the earlier 'Serenata', Tony provided the justice due to Buddy Coles' composition.

Next Tony introduced the Hanna and Barbera cartoon, which deservedly won an Academy Award in 1946, - 'The Cat Concerto', which saw a return of Tom and Jerry to the Hollywood Bowl stage. This time Tom is the solo (purportedly) artist playing the Liszt

Hungarian Rhapsody No. 2. Tony perfectly mimed the piece utilising the piano (plus organ) to replace the original sound-track, including the devastating (for Tom) final bars, enabling Jerry to take the bow.

Just prior to his final item, Tony took the opportunity to thank the TOSA(NSW), crew who had provided the video and computer back-up to his performance. He even mentioned that at 1-30PM Craig Keller was still downloading data to a new hard-drive, which became necessary for the success of the afternoon.

The 'final' piece was a spectacular organ-plus-piano item from the pen of the American composer and pianist virtuoso Louis Moreau Gottschalk. – 'The Grande Tarentelle'. Coincidentally this piece was a featured item on the 1987 recording referred to earlier with Tony and Ray Thornley - 'Black and White'. The virtuosity of the performance belied Tony's suggestion that the piece could be called a "fun piece". The delighted audience afforded Tony the sort of response due to a first class musical performance.

As an encore Tony 'Struck up the Band' with the favourite from the 1927 musical satire of the same name, on war and militaristic music, composed by George Gershwin. A very much more satisfying ending for Tony's concert, than for the 1927 musical.
