THE DEATH OF A MIGHTY WURLITZER

(from our Patron)

The above heading in this article refers to the original WurliTzer installed in the Hoyts Regent Theatre Melbourne in 1929.

It consisted of a four manual Water-fall polished Mahogany console and twenty one ranks of pipes. The sound of this instrument was truly magnificent in every way and the structure of the building matched it perfectly.

At the opening in 1929, Eddie Fitch an American organist, presided at the Console along with the Orchestra and what a treat it was to listen to all that glorious music, a vast difference from the guitar twanging rubbish that is inflicted on our ear drums today..

I had the privilege of being allowed to practise on the beautiful organ and sitting on its stool, one was transposed away into another world. At that time the organist of St.Pauls Cathedral (one Dr.A.E.Floyd) who was very 'anti' Theatre Organ, was asked to come around and hear this fine WurliTzer and upon doing so admitted he was amazed at the rich sound and in particular the perfect Cathedral tone of the 8ft Diapason when the instrument was played as a Grand Organ. Believe you me, coming from the good Doctor, that was a compliment indeed.

The organ was never recorded but in those early days was regularly heard over the ABC with Lionel Corrick at the Console and George Belmain, a fine Baritone singer a most popular session every Sunday night from 7-7.30pm.

In 1945 tragedy struck. The Theatre and its beautiful WurliTzer Organ were completely destroyed by fire and not one single part of that fine monarch of mighty sound survived, even the little 2 manual 12 rank in the Plaza below the Regent was badly damaged by water but later on, most of it was restored and it continued for years entertaining the public.

As a matter of fact I did all my early ABC broadcasts on the Plaza organ and a Grand little instrument it was too. Later on when the Regent was rebuilt, the organ they installed was part Ambassadors Perth and part old Lyceum Melbourne.

It never sounded anywhere near the rich singing glory of its predecessor that died so tragically by fire.

AUGUST CONCERT POPULAR

The FREE concert on Sunday 25th saw an excellent attendance of 512 people, all very anxious to hear a comparatively new artist at the Marrickville WurliTzer. He was David Smith of Sydney, a well known organ teacher who had not played at Marrickville since 1977. David had two co-artists to assist him on the day, Sharon Maennl and Damien Scott, both making their third or fourth appearance at Marrickville.

David Smith, an exponent of improvisation, soon had the audience spellbound with a huge introduction number which brought loud applause from all present and particularly from David's own personal 'cheer' squad which apparently was well represented.

Suffice to say for this short report that both younger artists gave an excellent account of themselves with both theatre style and classical presentations, and were well received by the audience.

Later in the programme, David (in my opinion) played his best number of the day, the mildly George Wrightish version of "Toot Toot Tootsie" which had everything in it including the Klaxon Horn, and this was the one that 'brought down the house' for the day.

Two encores were demanded, "Superstar" and "Smoke Gets In Your Eyes", before the delighted yells and applause from the cheer squad finally subsided. I feel that David's popularity calls for his inclusion in our 1986 programme as a must.

Theatre Organ în a Semînary

One of the highlights of the 1985 ATOS Convention in Chicago was the theatre organ installation located in Mundelein, Illinois. The are 1500 acres of woodlands as well as a 300 acre man-made lake on the grounds of the University of St. Mary of the Lake, built by the late George Cardinal Mundelein, after whom the town is named. Winding roads and spacious lawns lead to a 900-seat auditorium which houses the 4/24 theatre pipe organ. The overall layout of the campus is symmetrical about the chapel, and the architectural style is Colonial, chosen by the Cardinal because it was the "only purely American style".

Upon entering the somewhat plain auditorium, one cannot miss the Wurlitzer console with its ebony finish. It sits on a permanent platform at the left side of the sunken orchestra pit. This console has a unique history complete with pitfalls, literally.

It began life as the original console of the Chicago Theatre's mighty Wurlitzer, Opus 434, a 4/29 Style 285 Special. At some time early in its life, a maintenance man adjusted the organ lift and failed to replace the top limit switch. The relief house organist, unaware of the problem, took the console up during a show. At the point where the lift was supposed to stop, it didn't. Instead, the console fell forward onto the organist, seriously injuring him. The console and lift were little is recorded quickly repaired; about the organist. Jesse Crawford, the chief house organist, had just married the organist from the Roosevelt Theatre down the street and decided to add a second complete console to the Chicago Wurlitzer to play duets with his new bride, Helen Anderson. The second console was added to the left side of the pit along with an orchestra lift. The original organ lift was repositioned under Helen's new console and lesse's console was placed on the new orchestra lift with sufficient cable so that it could be moved about. In 1932 a stage console was added to the instrument. With Jesse and Helen's departure for the New York Paramount in 1927, only the stage console and Helen's with its separate lift, continued to be used.

The original console was eventually purchased by Al Carney for his radio studio pipe organ of 14 mostly Gott-fried ranks. With the death of Mr. Carney, the organ and the Chicago Theatre console were sold in 1934 to long time family friend, Cardinal Mundelein, for use in his seminary auditorium then under construction.

Cardinal Mundelein was an avid theatre organ and movie fan. He had two complete projection booths built on campus, one in the auditorium and a second one on the third floor of the residence across the lake from the auditorium. Being a friend of William Fox, Mundelein had access to all the first run Fox films. When films were shipped from Hollywood to New York for their grand openings, the planes would normally refuel in Chicago. At this point, the films were rushed out to St. Mary's for a special screening. As a film might arrive at any time of the day or night, the Cardinal's staff was always ready for a small premiere.

The person most called upon for these impromptu screenings was the "house organist", Reverend Charles N. Meter, a faculty member at the Seminary. Father Meter studied theatre organ with Dr. Eddy Eigenschenk of the Roosevelt Theatre. It was not unusual for the Cardinal to unwind after a long day in Chicago by taking a car from his Chicago residence and driving down Milwaukee Avenue with full police escort to the city limits. From this point it was all open farmland Mary's and reports are that 90 m.p.h. was not an uncommon speed for the Cardinal's car. Once arriving on the grounds, Father Meter would be called to provide organ accompaniment or intermission music for that night's film.

During the 1960's, with the new emergence of theatre organ interest, John Seng received permission to enlarge and rebuild the instrument. He retained six of the original ranks and added 16 new ranks, bringing the total to 22. All new stop tabs were installed along with a new AGO pedal board and a new combination action. The organ was used extensively for accompaniment of live theatre presentations, including musicals presented by the students. Many CATOE members received their first glimpse of theatre organ attending these open-to-the-public shows.

After John Seng left for California, John Peters and Fred Kruse took over the dual role of maintaining and improving the organ. In 1983, a new Trumpet was added, and in 1984 an English Post Horn, Orchestral Oboe, Krumet Horn and 16' Gamba were purchased to replace pipework that was on loan or provided for but never installed. A two-rank metal Flute Celeste has also been purchased and should be installed by Convention time. recently a gift from CATOE member Dennis Fugh has made possible the extension of the Diaphone to 16'. adding much-needed weight to the pedal division.

The organ also has a full complement of traps and tuned percussions, includ-

-ing Vibraharp, Metal Harp, Wood Harp, Glockenspiel and Xylophone. The organ is installed in four shallow chambers on either side of the stage. The shallow angle and size of the chambers make the sound projection into this room striking.

DOWN MEMORY LANE

No.19 of a Monthly Series by Frank Ellis.

In April 1940 Barrie Brettoner was in the news. He had signed a contract with Western Suburbs Cinemas and had opened at the Savoy Theatre Enfield on March 16th.

Reg Maddams at the De Luxe Theatre Wellington N.Z. had been thinking about getting back into the scene in Australia, but had decided to go to Europe instead as a soldier in the N.Z. Army.

Paul Cullen at the Civic Theatre Auburn had featured a song written by two Auburn boys, Kenneth Links and Raymond Donnelly. Its title was, "When I Come Smiling Through" and it was well up to the standard of most of the overseas songs then doing the rounds.

In last months "Down Memory Lane" article, an error occurred accidentally which I would like to correct.

In the second paragraph mention was made about rumours of a new electric organ said to be the invention of a local boy.

The instrument was said to be called "the Australian organ". This should have read "Australectic" organ and as I said last month nothing further was heard of the new organ and it was probably just a rumour after all.

The Duke Of York Theatre Eastwood had a new organist at that time too - he was Pierre de Closay. In 1985, this organ now fully restored and updated with electronics replacing the relays, is installed in the Epping Baptist Church. It was very recently visited by members of the Theatre Organ Society who heard it played by David Parsons, Neil Palmer, Bill Schumacher and Cliff Bingham.

Reubert Hayes was being featured on 4BH Brisbane every Tuesday morning - before the end of the war Reubert would become the most widely heard theatre organist in the country. His Sunday night live broadcast from the Brisbane Regent was a National program heard in all States and in many parts of the South Pacific war zone.

On March 15th that year, Jim Williams relieved Manny Aarons at the Sydney State Theatre for two weeks. Several records of the Victor Sylvestor orchestra heard on the air waves around this time, featured a theatre organ sound although some of the un-informed said it was an electronic organ. They were wrong of course - it was a theatre pipe organ they heard on the records and Robinson Cleaver was the organist.

Barrie Brettoner's opening presentation at the Savoy Enfield was a medley consisting of Rhapsody In Blue, Light Cavalry Overture plus a mix of Over The Rainbow and Roll Out The Barrel thrown in for good measure. It went down very well with a packed Saturday night audience.

Jim Williams was reported as having done an excellent job during his two weeks relieving Manny Aarons at the State. He featured A Tisket A Tasket which was one of Sydney Torch's popular records then on sale. Jim Williams and Des Tanner were very possibly the only two organists on the Sydney scene who really understood jazz and how to play it on a theatre organ -I guess I should also include Idwall Jenkins in that category. These three made an outstanding trio of organists really able to exploit the jazz idiom in a theatre organ situation. Well, that's it for this month - more bits and pieces for you in the next issue.

THE CHICAGO STADIUM BARTON

The Chicago Stadium was opened on March 30, 1929, billed as the "World's Indoor Arena," occupying Greatest entire city block at 1800 West Madison Street. The seating capacity is 25,000 with 18,000 permanent seats in three balconies and 7,000 main floor seats which are removable when the entire floor is used for circuses, ice hockey, basketball or other attractions. This huge enterprise originated with Mr. Patrick T. Harmon, who became director of president and managing the Chicago Stadium Corporation.

One of the features was to be a giant pipe organ, to be spectacular in both console appearance and musical sounds, designed to fill this great auditorium when filled with 25,000 people and with instrumentation that could follow all the action of the sports events to be presented. An organ in size and sound the like of which had never before been built.

Many big organ companies were bidding for the installation, organ companies famous for great church and cathedral organs, others for concert organs and for organs in super deluxe motion picture theatres. The contract was awarded to the Barton Organ Company. Factors in this decision were the specially designed Barton organs in two of Mr. Harmon's Chicago Ballrooms, installations made six years before the stadium was built. Both solved music problems for Mr. Harmon.

At the Dreamland, on Chicago's west side, the elevated tracks ran right across the top of the building and every time a train went past the noise drowned out the orchestra. We installed a two-manual organ on 25-inch wind pressure, two sets of Diapasons, Tuba, Posthorn, a large scale Bourdon and Tibia, a big String and a big Flute. The organ was used with the orchestra only when the trains went over. At the high point the music was more organ than orchestra, but no one stopped dancing.

At the Arcadia, on the north side, the dance floor was so large and the acoustics so bad that when the crowd was large they crowded around the orchestra in the centre with no dancers at either end. Twin organs installed at each end of the building and played with the orchestra solved this problem. The Dreamland and Arcadia installations made money for Paddy Harmon, and the Barton Organ Company gained a good friend.

A few short years after the stadium opened Mr. Harmon died as a result of an automobile accident. The Chicago Stadium Corporation has since been operated by its two owners, James D. Norris, chairman, and Arthur Wirtz, president.

The Chicago Stadium organ is the largest unit organ in the United States, and, so far as I know, the largest in the World. The console has six manuals and 883 stop tablets and controls. The organ is installed in five organ lofts, which are hung from the ceiling in the centre of the arena. Four lofts contain the chests, pipes, regulators and tremulants. One side of each loft forms the sides of a mixing chamber which is the size of one of the organ lofts. It has a dome ceiling and is open at the bottom. The mixing chamber forces the sound downward into the big arena. Each loft has a set of swell shutters which can be operated from the console, one set at a time or in any combination. The fifth loft contains the relays and blower.

The Spencer Orgoblo Company of Hartford, Connecticut, who made the blower stated at the time of installation that it was the largest organ blower in the United States. The blower is 16 feet long and is operated by a 100-h.p. motor. The air leaves the blower at four stages, starting at 15" pressure, 22" pressure, 50" pressure and the last stage producing the very high pressure used on the large-scale stops. The console is located on a platform

below the lower balcony at one end of the arena and is mounted on a lift with left or right turntable.



OUR FIRST BIRTHDAY ON FM RADIO

A bright future is assured for the former San Francisco Fox Theatre 4/36 Wurlitzer organ in the Lanterman mansion at La Canada (pronounced "Canyarda"), California, a suburb of Los Angeles. The big residence will eventually become the combination city hall and community centre of the City of La Canada Flintridge under terms of a recent redistribution of the property by Lloyd Lanterman, last descendant of the community's founding family.

City officials, who now conduct their business in two rented suites at the Villa Real professional building envision Foothill Boulevard, nearby the community centre and city hall with the Wurlitzer as the centrepiece for musical recitals and other social events to be held there. The large ballroom on the second floor will also be a perfect place for conducting City Council meetings that are now held in the La Canada High School library. They are also seeking to have the mansion entered on preservation books and declared an historical monument. It is expected some of the rooms of the big home will be turned into exhibit areas. In this regard, it is possible the American Theatre Organ Society may be represented.

Originally the largest share of the estate was to have been given to the University of Southern California, alma mater of Lloyd and his late brother Frank. The remainder of the property was willed to a local church. Frank had purchased the big Wurlitzer in 1963 and Lloyd engineered its installation in the residence.

Not long after Frank's death in 1981, Lloyd began to wonder what would happen to the home after his demise. It was built in 1914 and constructed of cement hand-mixed on the site, using gravel scooped from the surrounding hills. The university was not interested in the structure, and the local church officials declared they would be unable to afford to preserve the

property. This indicated to Lloyd the house would probably be destroyed. It was at this point Lloyd and his attorney, Harcourt Harvey, restructured distribution of the estate. Lloyd transfered his interest in the residence to the city, with the stipulation that he be allowed to live out the rest of his days there.

Lloyd, who is a spry and wiry 88, enjoys hearing the Wurlitzer when -ever anyone stops by and asks to play it. Although it isn't heard too frequently these days, it is well cared for and will be a great asset to the city.

Communications between ATOS and La Canada Flintridge city officials is currently maintained by Stephen Ross of Los Angeles Theatre Organ Society. Just what part the organ society will play in the community centre, once it becomes developed, is not clearly outlined. Talks cannot take place until the city takes possession.

Frank Lanterman, who was responsible for purchasing the Wurlitzer from Fox West Coast Theatres in 1963, was a retired California State legislator at the time of his death, and had been a professional theatre for the West Coast Theatre chain during the silent film era. He was chief organist for the circuit and resident artist at their Alex Theatre in Glen-He was also engaged by one of the large Australian Theatre Circuits (Union Theatres - Ed.) to open a large four-manual Wurlitzer in one of their new deluxe movie palaces. (State Theatre, Melbourne, 21-ranks, opened 1929, the instrument is now installed in the Moorabbin Town Hall - Ed.) He subsequently returned to his West Coast Theatres position.

While head of the chain's organ department, Lanterman was responsible for getting Wurlitzer to build their 2/10 Style 216 organ, many of which were installed in the West Coast houses. (Including the instrument once in the Rialto Theatre, Pasadena, recorded and made famous in later years by

George Wright in his record album "Live in Concert".) Frank once recalled that he drafted specification that ultimately became the Style 216 to provide organists greater flexibility over the 2/9 Style 215 instruments which West Coast Theatres had been ordering for their houses. "Farney (Wurlitzer) wasn't at all enthused about building this model until I casually mentioned that Van Nuys, California, was just half an hour drive from my office. He knew I would get the Robert-Morton Organ Company (in Van Nuys) to build such an organ and they would receive contracts to install them for us!"

During his tenure at the Alex Theatre, Lanterman was also designated by Jack Warner to accompany all prevue showings of Warner Brothers new releases. Warner would bring the films to the Alex from the Hollywood Boulevard studio after matinee performances and Frank would run them through a single time, then play them at the special evening showing. On several occasions Warner would arrive too late for Frank to run through a feature and he had to play them "cold" for the special showing.

(The TOSATOUR group who toured the West Coast just two years ago were privileged to be the guests of Mr. Lloyd Lanterman and to hear this famous Wurlitzer played by none other than our recent Convention artist Candi Carley) ... Ed.

While David entertains their guests on his beautiful Conn 651 Theatre Organ, Beverly (his other love) wields kettles in the kitchen, organises the supper and doubtless, cleans up the crumbs after the guests depart.

In the Queen's Birthday Honours List, it was announced that David was to be awarded the Order Of Australia Medal for services to charitable organisations. The investiture was at Government House on Friday 6th September.

A friend summed up David's reaction when he commented, "He's not a bit big-headed about it, he's just tickled pink." Presumably Beverly is tickled pink too!

Following the opening number Keep Your Sunny Side Up, we heard a superb arrangement of Here's That Rainy Day then a novelty piece, Sam's Song. I Just Called To Say I Love You by blind composer Stevie Wonder was a perfect choice for Warren to show off the WurliTzer's capabilities for ballads and his registration was ideal for this popular number.

Among many favourites we heard Duke Ellington's Dont Get Around Much Anymore, then a very different operetta by Emerich Kalman, The Countess Of Maritza which was I think a first for Marrickville. The first half ended with a combination of middle of the road favourites, When Golden Daffodils Grow, Basin Street Blues, the famous Jolson number Sunny Boy, then Repaz Band, which served to bring us all back to life for a cuppa at interval.

We attended the St.Barnabas' Chapel and heard the famous 103 year old Willis Organ (recently restored) during the service.



"FIVE ALIVE" - featuring five of Australia's best known popular organists:Tony Fenelon, Neil Jensen, John Atwell,
David Johnston and Ray Thornley, at
the 4-manual, now 15-rank WurlitzerChristie-Conacher Theatre Organ installed at the Capri Theatre, Goodwood,
Adelaide, South Australia.

This recording is a real landmark in the history of the Theatre Organ Society of Australia. It is now some years since any Division of T.O.S.A. has sponsored a record release - the last being the somewhat less than satisfactory recording made on the organ of Moorabbin Town Hall by Melbourne organist Ian Thomas. I'm pleased to say that this release is light years ahead of that one.

The history of this instrument would require a series of articles to give its full background so we'll just briefly discuss it here. The organ was assembled by the late Penn Hughes of pipework gathered from Sydney, Dunedin, N.Z. and Southampton, England, plus the slave console from the 4/21 Wurlitzer originally installed in the State Theatre, This compilation of parts Melbourne. various instruments was installed in the Hughes residence in Forest Road, Bexley for many years. Around 1968-1969 the organ was sold to Darwin music store owner Mike Pfitzner. Mike instrument transported the disembled to Darwin in a second-hand former Sydney double decker bus. The organ was never fully assembled whilst in Darwin and was removed only several Cyclone weeks before the notorious Tracey ravaged not only Darwin but the Pfitzner home.

Since its move to Adelaide remarkable things have happened not only to the organ but to the Society as well. The purchase of a theatre in which to house the instrument has been a remarkable achievement by the South Australian Division.

And so back to the record:-SIDE ONE opens with an up-tempo arrangement of "Anything Goes" played by Tony Fenelon. The record jacket states that it's "Based on Temple of Doom arr." which gives Tony a chance to use some way out sound effects but I personally would have preferred a straight rendition of this old favourite. Neil Jensen's first contribution to this recording is "Georgia On My Mind"controlled sensitively played and would be the best description, every type of sound from the big full theatre organ sound through strings, solo and chorus reeds and flues are featured in their turn. One of the best tracks on this recording is "Crazy Rhythym" as played by John Atwell which makes a nice contrast to the previous number but better is to come from John later on. The first time I heard Ray Thornley play "Taming The Tenor" I thought the piece was original material, and the British Novelty style in which this number is performed still makes it good listening. This track, though, exposes one flaw in the organ, that of the unglockenspiel. xylophone and enclosed Another unit of each is desperately needed inside the chambers especially for recording sessions - unenclosed percussions seldom record well!

"Wind Beneath My Wings" - John Atwell here demonstrates the big lush sounds of the Capri organ just as Neil did a few tracks back. The sounds are most reminiscent of the Organ Grinder, Portland Oregon U.S.A. Full combinations seem to suit this instrument and John's interpretation of this super piece is just right.

"Syncopated Clock" Johnston's David displays some of the novelty sounds glockenspiel. including the available xylophone, sleigh bells, chimes, klaxon horn and woodblock - this rendition is clever but sometimes wanders too far away from the melody. "When Love Is Gone" a beautiful ballad with Tony playing at his sensitive best - a great track. "Fame" may not be everyone's idea of a good track for a theatre organ recording. It is, however, most important as it is the type of music which should feature prominently during intermissions at the Capri. It is after all what young listeners are demanding.

"FIVE ALIVE"cnt'd.

SIDE TWO opens with "Mack & Mabel Overture" - the stuff which silent movie accompaniments are made. David Johnston again doing what he does best. From the film "Victor Victoria" comes "Le Jazz Hot", in Neil's hands the title describes it well.

A nice "Buddy Cole" style introduction to "Here, There and Everywhere" from Ray. The glock tends to marr the quiet mood of this ballad. "The Match Parade" just has to be my favourite on this record. Pure Sidney Torch - that great English novelty sound but with some passages of the American big theatre sound thrown in for good measure, Top work from John Atwell!

Neil's version of "Nobody Does It Better" solos the beautiful WurliTzer Tuba to good effect together also with some interesting string, tibia and vox combinations. Good sounds here.

In the last track on this recording "On a Clear Day" - Tony's intro features massed Tibias then swings into an upbeat version of this very familiar piece -also liked the jazz improvisation in the middle. To sum up, this first commercial recording of the Capri Theatre Organ reveals the fine sound this instrument already posesses. As explained on the cover notes the organ has been professionally regulated but some tonal balancing has yet to be done. To my ears the Conacher English Horn is still a little too prominent and requires so ftening to fit with the full organ ens-emble. Several other minor tonal problems reveal themselves to the critical listener but most will not even detect them unless they are pointed out. Alone for its Historic significance any member who owns a record player should buy this record, however more importantly I'm pleased to say that you should buy this record for the music, the artistry and great sound of this instrument.
